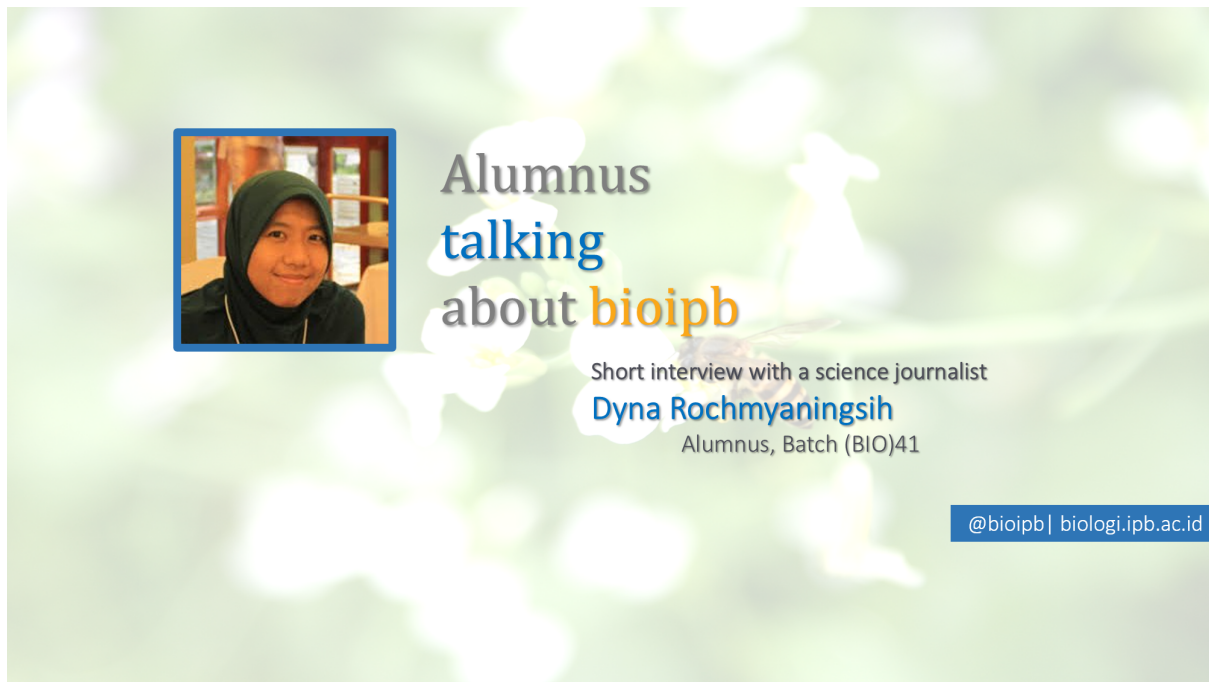


Find Your Passion Early

The easiest way is to answer certain question in a paragraph. Write it down Ask yourself. Does it answer the question? Does it have enough evidence? how is the logic? well above is the tips for argumentative writing..but I think you can apply it for narrative or academic writing

Finally, what is the one piece of advice you would give to future students of the Department?

It's simple. Find your passion early and stick on it.
